Value	This term, our focus is on the value of Kindness . In class, we will explore the importance of being kind in our everyday interactions, understanding how kindness can have a positive impact on others. Children will engage in activities that encourage them to demonstrate kindness within the classroom and the wider school community. Throughout the term, we will share and celebrate acts of kindness, fostering a positive and supportive environment.	
English	Reading: We will be reading Star of Fear, Star of Hope by Jo Hoestlandt and Erika's Story by Ruth Vander Zee, both of which explore themes of courage, friendship, and survival during challenging times. These emotionally rich texts provide opportunities for children to delve into complex issues such as resilience, empathy, and the impact of historical events on individuals and communities. 	Writing: Our writing focus this term will be on crafting a story with a flashback. Children will learn how to structure narratives that move between different time frames, developing their use of descriptive language and character development. They will use Star of Fear, Star of Hope and Erika's Story as inspiration for their own stories, with an emphasis on incorporating flashbacks that reveal key moments in the characters' pasts.

	Number: Place Value: We will start the term by revisiting place value, focusing on numbers up to 1,000,000 for Year 5 and 10,000,000 for Year 6. Children will learn to read, write, compare, and order these numbers, as well as work with negative numbers and Roman numerals.	Measure: Perimeter and Area: Children will learn how to calculate the perimeter and area of various shapes, including composite rectilinear shapes. Year 6 pupils will also explore volume, learning how to calculate the volume of cubes and cuboids.
